


Stem Workshops




THE GOLDEN HOOTER


Year 2 News

This week, Year 2 have had great fun looking at time in science for our STEM week. We looked at the evolution of dinosaurs over time. We discussed whether they were herbivores, omnivores or carnivores and sorted them into groups. We also used our fine motor skills to make pasta dinosaurs.




We were also fascinated to see how kitchen towel absorbed the coloured water from our cups over time and then started to drip the liquid into our empty cups. We were able to accurately predict which new colours would be made, based on our colour mixing knowledge.






We also worked well to design our own clocks and thought about what each clock hand is for. We thought about how much exercise we could do in one minute and then had a go at completing the exercises and observing the changes in our bodies.



Year 4 News

Since this week was STEM week, Year 4 had the opportunity to make our very own Maths game, based on this year's theme of 'time'. Firstly, we recapped what time is and discussed how it is used in everyday life. Secondly, we planned and designed our game in small groups and used a range of materials to create them. Some children chose to make board games, others made UNO and snap cards. We even had football-related time questions! We really enjoyed our day on Wednesday - it was fun, exciting and nice to do something different.















Orchard News

This week on Monday in The Orchard, all the classes had the opportunity to participate in a maths workshop; the children were completing problem-solving activities. One activity was to follow instructions and create a cube from a variety of 2D shapes. The children worked in groups to encourage teamwork, turn taking and social skills.

In English, Cherry class have been continuing to develop their rhyming skills; they have been identifying rhyming words and finishing rhyming sentences. Apple and Plum class have been working on adjectives (descriptive words) and applying these to their writing skills.

String Stars!

This week, we were honoured to host three semi-finalists from the globally acclaimed Windsor Festival International String Competition.

On Monday, Year 4 were visited by 17-year old Australian violinist Edward Walton, who played some beautiful Bach and Brahms music to the children and answered some of their questions. He had begun learning the violin aged just 3! Rosie Taylor (who we recognised from last term's 'Fred and the amazing Tub-Tub' orchestra visit) linked in with our STEM week theme of Time, explaining that Bach was born in 1685, but because he wrote down his music, we can hear it performed in the same way over 300 years later!

On Tuesday, Year 3 were visited by Polish viola player Kinga Wojdalska and Canadian cellist Andrew Byun. Each of them played some music for the children , who were captivated by the special effects an cartoony sounds in the cello music of Penderecki, and loved the beautiful Bach played on viola. We discovered that Kinga regularly practises for 4-5 hours per day, and Andrew sometime plays for up to 6 hours a day when preparing for an important concert or festival! His cello was made in 1690, so is over 330 years old. We thank Rosie for arranging the visits and leading the rhythm & pulse workshop elements with our Y3 and Y4 children, and wish all of our visiting musicians the best of luck in the competition (the final will be held on Friday evening so we will know the results by next week). We are so lucky to have met and heard these amazing and inspiring young string players. What a fabulous opportunity to experience wonderful music-making!
