
#### Our Learning

#### This week:

In math this week, we started a new unit on addition and subtraction within 20. The children used tens frames and counters to work our simple addition number sentences. They also used the tens frames to apply their knowledge of number bonds to 10 to help them more efficiently work out numbers bonds to 20. For example: using 4 +2 to work out 14+2.

In English this week, we started our new class text: What the ladybird heard. We read the story as a class and then spent time creating our own story maps.

In afternoon sessions this week, we focussed on how the children can stay healthy. The children drew the different healthy choices they could make such as eating fruit and veg or brushing their teeth!

#### Our Learning

This week in English, we read our new story: The Queen's Hat and generated lots of descriptive words and phrases to describe different London landmarks before writing our own descriptions.



In maths, we have been looking at the concept of multiplication and building and drawing equal



groups then writing the repeated addition sentence to match.

In History, we enjoyed ilearning about the different fea-

tures of a castle and looking at how Windsor Castle has changed over time.

In Computing, we have start-

ed looking at recording data with a focus on making and interpreting tally charts this week. Next week, we are going to start learning our own class story version of The Queen's Hat and practise re-telling it with actions in English. In maths, we are going to continue with multiplication, looking at arrays and using the X symbol to write multiplication number sentences. In DT, we are going to be making shortbread biscuits and looking at where the different ingredients

come from. We are also looking

forward to celebrating World Book Day on Friday, where we will be looking at the determination of the

character Floyd, who shows great determination to get his kite back in the story: Stuck, by Oliver Jeffers.



#### Our Learning

This week, we have been busy rehearsing for our performance of Disney's Finding Nemo Kids. We are really looking forward to sharing the show with our families next week. In Maths, we have been continuing to explore measurement of length using metres, centi- metres and millimetres. In English, we have begun a unit of work inspired by a poem called the Sound Collector.

Next week, we have a busy week with our performances and World Book Day. Children are encouraged to come to school on Friday dressed as a book character or wearing pyjamas as a celebration of bedtime stories. In Maths, we will be learning how to calculate the perimeter of 2d shapes and beginning a unit of work focussing of fractions. In English, we will continue to explore how poems are constructed. In Art, we will be creating a collage drawing together what we have learnt.

#### Our Learning

**This week** we have continued to practise the final parts for our performance. The children are very excited to share their wonderful performance with you all.

In English, the children have been writing their stories and we have really been thinking about how to use adjectives and fronted adverbials to describe different scenes.

In Maths, the children have been calculating the area by working out the length of each side by counting the squares and adding them together. Some of the children found this challenging and we had to remind them to take their time and not rush.

**Next week in English,** we will be moving on to our new story 'The boy in the back of the classroom'. The children will be starting to explore the new characters and learning new vocabulary from the book.

**In Maths**, we are continuing to look at perimeter but we will be moving on from rectilinear shapes to polygons.

In the afternoons, we will be creating our art collages with plastics so please remember to bring in plastic bottles, lids, bubble wrap and single use carrier bags.

This week, we started our history unit on the Islamic Empire. In our first lesson, we looked at a range of artefacts and made inferences about the people who may have used them.



#### Our Learning

**This week,** we begun our history unit on The Islamic Empire. Initially, we explored artefacts and used our inference skills. We then used our comparison skills to compare ancient Baghdad with London.

**In maths,** we continued with our decimals unit and applied our knowledge of thousandths in fractions and decimals, whilst also ordering and comparing.

In English, we continued focusing on plastic pollution and persuasive pitches with an aim to writing our own pitch. We also began a Reading Skills unit in which we learn how to approach the dreaded reading paper more efficiently.

This term in PSHRE, we began our 'Healthy Me' topic and looked at making healthy choices as we grow older.

**Next week,** we will continue exploring the Islamic Empire before starting our RE unit in which will learn all about Islam as a religion.

**In maths,** we will learn new strategies across percentages, linking them to: fractions, decimals, rectilinear shapes.

**In English,** we will research our chosen topic and write our own persuasive pitch focusing on either walking to school, fast fashion or planting trees in public spaces.

#### History -The Mayans







#### Our Learning

This week, in history, we started our topic on the Ancient Mayans! We learnt about where and when their civilisation was and how their society was structured. We also had the chance to taste different chocolates as it was considered a luxury in Mayan society!

In English, we used information we know about the Red-Eye virus (from The Last Wild) to write our very own newspaper report!

In maths, we completed our topic on percentages. Next, we explored the area and perimeter of rectilinear shapes.

After half term, in history, we will learn more about the Mayan Gods and their importance in Mayan society. In computing, we will use the software 'scratch' and use 'coding' to make our spirits move!

In English, we will be exploring more of the story through drama and conscience alleys. We will make informed decisions and put ourselves in the role of the character.

In maths, we will focus on calculating the area of triangles and a parallelogram.

PSHRE Focus: Healthy Me. In PSHRE this term, we will learn how to take responsibility for our wellbeing. We will know about different types of drugs and how they affect the human body — particularly the liver and the heart. I will understand that some people can be exploited and made to do things that are against the law. I will know why some people join gangs and the risks this involves. I understand what it means to be emotionally well and can explore people's attitudes towards mental health/illness.

# **Our SEND Conference January 2025**

# In January we held our Annual SEND Conference for SEND partnership professionals.

This was the second SEND conference, guided by Slough's SEND & Inclusion Strategy with a focus on strengthening partnership working.

# Introducing our Designated Social Care Officer (DSCO)



Let me introduce myself, I'm Stephen Mason, Designated Social Care Officer (DSCO), you may hear the role referred to as the "disco," so you can imagine the jokes I get!

I was delighted to join Slough at the beginning of February and play a role in developing the DSCO role as part of the children's services improvement journey. I'm still getting to know Slough, so do feel free to contact me and introduce yourself.

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#### So, what does a DSCO do?

Primarily it's to have a passion and commitment to promoting and developing quality services that promote inclusion and positive outcomes, for our Children and Young People with Special Educational Needs and/or Disability. (SEND).

#### Social care and SEND

The DSCO is the single point of contact for information in and out of social care, ensuring social care meets its statutory responsibilities, by providing quality advice for Education Health & Care Assessments, joining up our plans and interventions with Education and Health. Also, ensuring social care contributions to annual reviews. When plans and meetings join up it is easier for parent carers, and children and young people, and makes the best use of our resources.

#### Listening and learning

An important part of the role is listening to the experiences of parent carers, and children and young people, understanding what works well, and what we can do better. This supports co-production, working together to make positive changes including in our systems and processes.

#### Preparing for adulthood

Working with colleagues in adult social care by ensuring we understand the support a young person may need beyond the age of 18. Effective preparation for adulthood and 'transition' ensures an effective handover to adult services, encouraging and supporting independence, inclusion, and a purposeful adult life.

#### **Quality matters**

This involves quality assuring colleagues' work, through auditing advice and files, so we can identify and share best practice and keep learning.

### Inclusion, independence and success

And finally, it's about championing the needs and the inclusion of our children and young speople with additional needs, by having a good understanding and appreciation of the challenges faced, having high aspirations and expectations, and looking for ways to encourage skills and independence, across all our services and local communities.

So, I don't think I'll have any time to be bored. There is much to be celebrated and built upon in the work within social care and the SEND partnership, but clearly there is a more to do. I welcome the challenge and look forward to working in partnership with everyone, so we can proudly say and evidence that our children and young people with SEND are Happy, Safe & Loved, Thriving.

#### Slough Local Area Partnership Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Inspection

Agencies in the Slough Local Area SEND partnership are expecting an imminent phone call from Ofsted and CQC to announce a Local Area Partnership SEND inspection.

Most parents and carers are familiar with the Office for Standards in Education, Children's Services and Skills (OFSTED). This organisation inspects all our education settings and social care services. Some parents and carers are less familiar with the Care Quality Commission (CQC). They inspect our Health Services and General Practitioner Services. Together these agencies will inspect the quality of the Special Educational Needs and Disability services across Slough (SEND) focusing on the experiences of children and young people with SEND aged 0 to 25 who need extra support to learn and grow.

Area SEND inspections also include looking at services for children and young people who live in the local area, but go to school or are cared for in other areas.

The inspection process aims to find out about the positive and not so positive experiences, of parents and carers, and children and young people, who receive services. This includes education services e.g. schools, early years settings and colleges; health services including CAMHS and therapies such as Speech and Language Therapy; care services such as Early Help and support from the Children with Disabilities Team and the offer of short breaks. Inspectors will also talk to Special Voices (our Parent Carer Forum) and other parent groups.

Crucially inspectors want to know how well local services work in partnership to improve the lives of children and young people with SEND.

# SEND Team Update/Phased Transfer

It's been an incredibly busy few weeks in the SEND team as all school aged children with EHCPs who are moving from Nursery to Reception, and Year 6 to Year 7, go through what is called 'Phased Transfer'.

This means that the SEND Team have been working under pressure with parents and schools to name the children's schools for September 2025. Our performance has

improved this year and next year it will be even smoother.

Taking on board feedback from schools and parents, SEND team managers are carrying out briefing sessions on improvements to Phased Transfers for the next cycle. We will be consulting with schools and parents to arrange these sessions post Easter, so please look out for announcements.

# Upcoming careers event hosted by Together as One and Slough & Langley College

This March, we are thrilled to partner with Slough & Langley College to host our inaugural careers event specifically designed for young people (16+) with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND).

- connect with people who have SEND and are thriving in the workplace
- learn new skills through interactive workshops.

While the structure of the day will feel familiar to many of you, we've tailored it to better meet the needs of the attendees. For instance, we will closely manage the

number of participants at any given time to avoid overwhelming those affected by sensory overload.

- individuals within your organisation who have SEND and are willing to share their journeys will do so from 29m-1.20pm
- skills workshop leaders from 10.40am-2pm.
